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William McNally

The New York Times calls William McNally "a hot item" and "powerful". The Santa Barbara Independent referred to him as a pianist "...with great sympathy and insight"

William is the 2016 and 2017 winner of the world Championship Old-Time Piano Playing Contest, held in Oxford, Mississippi and the first



three-time winner of its New Rag Contest. A CD release (*Chickens 'n' Kittens: a Ragtime Coup*) follows his interest in modern and classically trained ragtime composers. He has presented papers on the transatlantic voyages of ragtime at the Society for American Music 2014 Conference and at the Scott Joplin Festival in Sedalia, MO. William will be the Scott Joplin Foundation Artist In Residence the Week of February 25 to March 1, presenting educational concerts to students throughout Pettis County, MO.

William McNally received degrees from the Mannes College of Music and Temple University, studying with Jacob Lateiner, Jerome Rose, Harvey Wedeen and Lambert Orkis. He has performed in the master classes of Sergei Babayan, Claude Frank, Paul Schenly, Peter Serkin, Arie Vardi and Earl Wild, among others. In 2015 he completed a Doctor of Musical Arts degree together with a Doctoral Certificate in American Studies at the City University of New York's Graduate Center; there he studied with Ursula Oppens. His dissertation, "Ragtime Then and Now," is being prepared for publication. He joined the faculty of Texas State University in 2016, and currently lives in New Braunfels with his wife, Dasha, and three–year–old son Nick, where he spends most of his "free" time cooking. Shortly after his ninth birthday, he performed for the first time in Carnegie Hall's Weill Recital Hall as a winner of the AMSA World Piano Competition. However, William McNally's interests are not limited to piano and ragtime. He has returned to that venue often, including once in Stern Auditorium as principal bassist of the Mt. Lebanon H.S. Orchestra, and in Zankel Hall as director of opera-shorts presented by the Remarkable Theatre Brigade. He has also performed in Alice Tully Hall in Lincoln Center, Merkin Hall, Steinway Hall, Elebash Hall of the City University of New York, and other venues in New York City.

William's 2018 CD, *Dream Shadows*, was released to high acclaim: reviews in Fanfare Magazine—two of them—called the recording "highly natural and persuasive...his prismatic range of touch and tone allows him to trace out the shifting moods of the music—from the sentimental to the nonchalant to the smashing—with unusual sensitivity...the disc is so good, from beginning to end, that it's hard to know what to highlight...a treasure!" On this, "Drean Shadows, NcNally performs ragtime works by William Albright, William Bolcum, Igor Stravinsky and David Feurzeig and his own composition. In 2013,William released a CD of works by Brahms, Reger and Busoni as part of the Victor Elmaleh Collection, which the New York Times called "exhilarating" "adventurous," and "commanding."

Bill McNally will be the 2019 Scott Joplin Foundation Artist in Residence. In that capacity he will spend the week of February 25 through March 1 presenting educational concerts before the students from 20 schools throughout Pettis County, MO. Johnny Maddox (1927 to 2918)¹

The music world lost a enthusiastic advocate and performer of ragtime music on November 27, 2018 when Johnny Maddox died near his birth home and long-time residence of Gallatin, Tennessee. Johnny's legendary career was built on his love of ragtime music which he learned from his great-aunt. His first public performance was at age 5 and his first professional performance was at the age of 12 in Gallatin.

As a young musician, one of Johnny's first jobs was in Randy's Record Shop in Gallatin. This was the beginning of his recording career. The owner, Randy Wood, founded Dot Records. Johnny was a key factor in the growth of Dot Records to become one of the top recording companies of the 1950s. In 1954, Johnny Maddox was voted the Number 1 Jukebox artist in the country and in 1958 his recording of Bob Willis' "San Antonio Rose" sold over a million copies. In the 1950s and 1960s Johnny toured the world with many of the famous performers of the time.

At the beginning of the 1970s, Johnny started to think of settling down and retiring, but he did not finally end his career and settle down until 2012. In the intervening years he lived and played in Austria, Alexandria, VA, where he was the featured pianist at II Porto Restorante, and finally, Durango, CO, where he was the resident pianist at the Diamond Belle Saloon at the Strater Hotel.^{2, 3}

Johnny Maddox was also referred to as Crazy Otto. Many people thought he was Crazy Otto and at times Johnny took Crazy Otto as his stage name. The real Crazy Otto was Fritz Schulz-Reichel, a German pianist with a unique ragtime style. Johnny Maddox's 1955 recording of "The Crazy Otto Melody", written by Fritz Shulz Reichel was an instant hit. It was the #2 selling record and the first all-piano record to sell more than one million copies.

Johnny Maddox was also known as a musicologist, music historian and collector of sheet music. His collection included more than 100,000 items of antique sheet music⁴, piano rolls, records and photographs.

4 – Shortly before the death of Johnny Maddox, it was announced that Andrew Greene, Director of the Peacherine Ragtime Society Orchestra (which played for KCRB last October) had obtained a considerable part of Johnny Maddox's sheet music collection. The Peacherine Ragtime Society Orchestra will include many of these compositions in their concerts and recordings.
